The Future of the Southbury Training School Part One: Southbury Farmlands

The Southbury Training School (STS) in Connecticut, which covers a significant area within the 69th House District, faces an uncertain future due to a court decree. Originally established in 1937 on 1,700 acres, STS was designed to house 1,200 residents with intellectual developmental disabilities in a progressive environment that aimed to provide training and employment opportunities. However, after a 1986 decision to cease admitting new residents, the facility began to decline, and its agricultural lands were largely abandoned. While the conventional approach of the town of Southbury has been to wait for the state to determine the future of STS, I felt that Southbury should actively participate in planning for its future.



During my tenure as First Selectman, I successfully initiated efforts to repurpose the Southbury Farmlands, a key component of the STS property. In 2011, I facilitated at a meeting with state officials, leading to the transfer of the farmlands to the Department of Agriculture (DoAg) with an agricultural easement managed by the Southbury Land Trust. This process involved complex negotiations and legislative action, ultimately resulting in the leasing of five farm areas to new and young farmers. I am particularly proud of the success of these initiatives, especially the establishment of Hidden Gem Orchards, which serves as a model for future agricultural development on the property.

However, since I left office in 2015, progress on the Southbury Farmlands has stalled. While the existing farmers continue to thrive, little has been done to further develop the site, such as demolishing obsolete buildings, expanding farming opportunities, and improving the water supply system. I am concerned that the current leadership has not been involved in or aware of ongoing studies and initiatives related to the farmlands. My previous successes demonstrate my ability to lead these efforts, and if re-elected, I pledge to take an active role in shaping the future of STS.
